Appendix A. Guide for focus group discussion.

1. Think back to when you first became involved with the participatory video project. What were your first impressions of the project?
2. What made you keep coming back to the project workshops?
3. Now that you have finished the project, how would you describe participatory video to somebody who has never been involved in it?
4. What was it like to show your personal video to others?
5. What would you hope people who watch the group video understand about your experiences and stories?
6. Do you think the way you talk about your experiences has changed since being involved in the project? If yes, how has it changed? If no, why do you think there has not been a change?
7. Do you think the way you work with others who may be different from you has changed since being involved in the project? If yes, how has it changed? If no, why do you think there has not been a change?
8. Since you were all committed to this project, what motivated you to continue to work together to share your stories and experiences?
9. What did you like most about being involved in the project?
10. If you could advise decision-makers about participatory video projects, what would you want them to know?
11. If you had the option of recommending the participatory video project to other young people at PEPP, would you choose to do so? If yes, why would you make the recommendation? If no, why would you not make such a recommendation?
12. Is there anything else you would like us to know?

Appendix B. Guide for follow-up interviews.

1. It has been three months since you were involved in the participatory video project. Tell me a little bit about what you remember most from being involved in the project.
2. Do you tell others about your role helping to produce these videos (e.g., friends, family, peers, etc.)? If yes, what do you tell them when you talk about the project and your involvement in it? If no, why do you choose not to talk about the project with others?
3. You did a lot of work to produce these videos. What are you most proud of now that they are finished?
4. Have you watched the videos since they were completed? If yes, what do you think about when you watch them now? If no, why do you choose not to watch them now?
5. Did you learn anything new having been involved in the participatory video project? If yes, what did you learn? If no, what did you hope you would learn?
6. Do you use any skills you developed through the participatory video project in other areas of your life (e.g., communicating your story with others, supporting others in telling their stories, project planning, meeting deadlines, technical skills, etc.)? If yes, what skills do you use now that you learned during your involvement in the project? If no, what skills would have been helpful for you to have learned during the project?
7. You had the opportunity to meet and work with other young people as part of the project. How did you feel knowing everyone needed to support each other in order to make sure the group video was completed?
8. Do you feel like the way you deal with people who are different from you has changed since being involved in the project? If yes, how has it changed? If no, why do you think there has not been a change?
9. Do you feel like the way you talk with other people about your experiences has changed since being involved in the project? If yes, how has it changed? If no, why do you think there has not been a change?
10. Did you learn anything new from the other members of the group during your work together? If yes, what did you learn from the other members? If no, why do you think you did not learn anything from the other members?
11. If you had more opportunities to work on a participatory video project, would you stay involved? If yes, why would you want to do so? If no, why would you not want to do so?

12. Is there anything else that you would like to tell us about your experiences with the participatory video project?
